FROM YOUR RECTOR... by the Reverend Sean Ferrell



Saint Luke's is now one hundred seventy five years old. We have chosen to celebrate this event in the fall. (Lord knows it's hard to compete with the summertime vacations of Episcopalians!) So I am pleased to announce that on Wednesday, October 3, we will celebrate our 175th anniversary as a congregation with Bishop Johnson, first with a service at 5:30, then with a catered dinner, and a silent auction of relics and artifacts from the re-construction of our nave. In addition, we will have a special speaker, and as soon as I am able to confirm with them, I will announce the person who will be with us. This will be a joy-filled celebration, not only of our past, but of our bright future as a congregation. I pray that you will plan to be with us.

As I mentioned in my sermon on July 22, the scriptures are full of stories of God calling ordinary people and using them to do extraordinary things, and even in difficult times. Back in 1832 at the time of our founding, the Episcopal Church was finally coming into its own. Because of the legacy of the Revolutionary war for independence from England, the new Episcopal Church (formerly the Church of England in the colonies) grew quite slowly from the years 1789 (at its founding) to 1811. In those first decades after 1789, the future looked bleak to many Episcopalians. Disestablishment had taken the revenues of the church in the colonies where it had been established, evangelical denominations took away many of its poorer members, Deism had disaffected many, and death had taken away many who remained faithful. After 1811, history speaks of the Second Great Awakening when religious revival spread throughout the United States. A missional push was finally underway in the Episcopal Church.

The Episcopal Church revival ran from the 1811 until the 1840s. During this period, for example, the Diocese of New York, encompassing the whole state, grew from 25 clergy, 40 congregations, and 2,300 communicants to 133 clergy, 165 congregations, and 6,700 under the supervision of Bishop John Henry Hobart during this period.

It wasn't until the 1820s that the Episcopal Church came to Tennessee. In July of 1829, Bishop John Ravenscroft of North Carolina came to Nashville for an organizational meeting that started laying plans for an Episcopal diocese in Tennessee. The meeting consisted of Bishop Ravenscroft, three clergymen, and six lay delegates. A constitution and canons were adopted, and 4 congregations were recognized as part of the newly formed diocese: Christ Church, Nashville; St. Peter's, Columbia; St. Paul's, Franklin; and St. John's, Knoxville.

In 1832, Mrs. Mary Hayes Willis Gloster was an ordinary widow and grandmother, who at 52 years of age decided there needed to be Episcopal Churches in West Tennessee, not just in Middle and East Tennessee. And so she took it upon herself to ride on horseback to Franklin to see Fr. Otey,

the chief missionary in the diocese- the man who would be elected the first Bishop of Tennessee a year later. She traveled with a grandchild in one hand and peach brandy in the other as a gift for Father Otey. The peach brandy was in case Fr. Otey needed some extra-convincing. The infant grandchild was carried because she reasoned that no bandit would dare attack a woman with an infant. As a result, later that year five congregations were planted here in West Tennessee. The first was Saint Luke's, followed by Immanuel, LaGrange, Christ Church, Brownville, Calvary, Memphis, and St. Paul's in Randolph.

And so on July 23, 1832 (a decade after Madison County, Tennessee was organized) a small group of ordinary persons "friendly" to the Episcopal faith met at the Masonic Hall to establish the Episcopal Church in Jackson. Finally, after worshipping in the Masonic Hall for 13 years, Saint Luke's Parish saw a building erected in 1845. The church building that stood at the corner of Church and Baltimore streets until 2003 was completed in 1883, when the original nave was expanded and a vestibule and bell tower were added.

Saint Luke's has persevered through times of strength and of difficulty. In those early years, there were many times when Saint Luke's simply had no rector. We have seen arduous times and glorious ones, the Civil War and then the rebuilding years of the 1880s and 90s, through the Great Depression, and the return of the GI Generation after WWII, and most recently through an F4 tornado in May of 2003 and the re-dedication of our nave last September. Through it all, Saint Luke's has sought to bring the good news of God in Christ to the people of Jackson, Tennessee, continuing as a congregation experiencing resurrection even in the face of difficult times. Throughout our history, this congregation has been graced with ordinary people whom God has chosen to use.

Please take a moment and mark October 3 on your calendar. I know it will be an occasion you won't want to miss. Come and help us celebrate our past and our bright future. Many blessings to you!

THE ALTAR GUILD IS GROWING!

Holy Eucharist every Sunday and Wednesday, high feast days, baptisms, weddings - St. Luke's is a happening place. And for every sacrament at the church, you can be sure the Altar Guild came in early to prepare the outward and visible signs of it.

Are you interested in Altar Guild work? Our commission is to be sure that everything that we do is done decently and in order. Join us and discover for yourself the serene rewards of handling holy things in a holy place. The Altar Guild is currently expanding to meet the growing needs of St. Luke's, and we need you!



What's Involved?

We set up communion for Holy Eucharist on Sunday and Wednesday, plus any other services that are scheduled during our two-week term. There's usually a Saturday morning set-up, when we change the altar frontal according to the day or season, polish brass and silver as needed, and change the candles. Saturday set-up typically takes an hour and a half. Between the services on Sunday there is a clean-up from the 8:00 service and reset for 10:30, and clean-up after the last Sunday service takes 20-30 minutes.

We serve on teams, each team on duty for two weeks at a time. The team members usually split up the duties so that not everyone on the team has to set up for all the services. Your team will work with you so that you can serve when it best fits into your schedule.

What if I don't know anything about Altar Guild work?

Not to worry. You will receive complete training and a supportive team. An Altar Guild manual (complete with pictures!) will soon be available in the sacristy for handy reference.

MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS

A letter from Bishop Don E. Johnson, July 23, 2007

Dear Diocesan Clergy and Lay Leaders,

As you know, support of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) is one of the mission priorities for The Diocese of West Tennessee.

In early August, Episcopal households in West Tennessee will receive a special edition of Episcopal Life devoted to the MDGs. I hope this information not only assists us in broadening our understanding of what is involved in reducing global poverty, but also in fulfilling our Baptismal promise to "seek and serve Christ in all persons" in ways that will truly make a difference in the lives of so many people in need.

Two key volunteers are working in our Diocese to coordinate initiatives for education on the MDGs and the fulfillment of the eight goals to cut extreme global poverty in half by 2015. Betty Johnson, a parishioner of Grace-St. Luke's Church, is our Diocesan Coordinator for Episcopal Relief and Development. Betty may be reached at bettyjohnsonbbj@aol.com. Evelyn Piety, a parishioner of St. Mary's Cathedral, serves as our Diocesan Representative for Episcopalians for Global Reconciliation. ABOUT THE MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Every day more than 60,000 people worldwide die needlessly because food and basic health care is not available to them. Of those, 30,000 are children. That's one child dying needlessly every three seconds. Four children have died preventable deaths in the time it took you to read this paragraph.

Our humanity tells us it shouldn't be this way. An amazing coalition of development economists, world leaders, teachers, businesspeople and many, many others, tell us it doesn't have to be this way. The Gospel tells us that we are the ones who need to make sure it isn't this way any longer.

In September, 2000, all the nations of the world pledged support to the Millennium Development Goals, a mutually agreed upon structure for them to join together and practically address the eight biggest threats to human security in the world today.

President George W. Bush reaffirmed the support of the United States at the United Nations Summit in September 2005.

Along with the Roman Catholic Church and all mainline Protestant denominations, the Episcopal Church USA has joined with the Church of England and committed to support the Millennium Development Goals and the "0.7% solution". For more information go to www.e4gr.org.
